Starter:

How to Make a Cheog

Do you want to create your own mythical creature? Have you looked at Mother Nature and thought that you could do a better job? Then look no further than these instructions. In just 10 easy steps you can make your own cheog – a cheetah and dog mix.

You will need:

- Black paint as dark as the night sky
- 2 sturdy and strong dog legs
- A pair of floppy ears that love to be scratched

Method:

1. Firstly, gather all of your equipment together.
2. Then, take the 2 sturdy and strong dog legs and the 2 fast cheetah legs. You will need to decide what combination you will want to put them in.
